SCOUT OATH

On my honor I will do my best to do my duty to God and my country and to obey the Scout Law; to help other people at all times; to keep myself physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight.

SCOUT LAW

A Scout is trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent.

MISSION

The mission of the Boy Scouts of America is to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Scout Law.

PACK PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

YOUR SCOUT IS A MEMBER OF A DEN...

- A den is made up of no more than 10 Cub Scouts who are the same age and/or grade.
- The den meets two to three times a month. For Tigers only, one of the den meetings each month is a "Go See It" or field trip.
- The den has a den leader, but the den leader shares the planning of the den meetings with the parents.

VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP: THE DEN

LION DEN Lion Guides, who are experienced Cub Scouters, serve as liaisons between the Lions and the Pack. Scouts and their parent or guardian join the den and attend all monthly meetings and activities together.

TIGER CUB DEN Similar to Lions, parents or guardians attend all meetings and activities. The den is made up of three to eight parent-child teams. Each den has a Tiger Cub den leader (one of the parents) who helps coordinate the meetings. The parent-child teams take turns hosting the activities and plan the meetings with the Tiger Cub den leader. The den has three meetings a month: two meetings are focused on either a required or elective adventure; and the monthly pack meeting.

WOLF AND BEAR CUB SCOUT DENS Parents are vital to Cub Scout dens. Parents help the den leader, and support the Cub Scout at home. Scouts are beginning to be more independent. The den consists of four to eight youth, a den leader and assistant den leader (parent of some of the children), and usually a den chief (a Scouts BSA Scout who helps the den leader). They meet at least twice monthly at a regularly scheduled time and place, and attend monthly pack meetings with their families.

WEBELOS SCOUT DEN In Webelos dens, more emphasis is placed on the children taking leadership roles as they prepare for Scouts BSA. Webelos work on requirements for the Webelos Badge during the first year. In the second year, the Scout works on requirements for the Arrow of Light (the highest award in Cub Scouting).

YOUR SCOUT IS A MEMBER OF A PACK...

- A pack consists of several dens and meets at least once a month.
- The Cubmaster leads the monthly pack meeting, but each den will have a part in the pack meeting.
- Some months, the pack meeting will have special themes such as Pinewood Derby, Blue & Gold Banquet, or guest speakers. Other months may be devoted to recognizing the Scouts for the projects they have completed.

VOLUNTEER LEADERSHIP: THE PACK

COMMITTEE CHAIR Conducts monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting to help plan program. Ensures that committee members give adequate support to the Cubmaster and den leaders. Helps recruit additional leaders as needed.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS Attend monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting to help plan the program and take care of records, finances, advancement, activities and membership.

PACK TRAINER Conducts orientation for new families and pack leaders. Trains new leaders for their specific positions or encourages participation in district training. Conducts other training as designated. Keeps track of pack training records.

CUBMASTER Conducts monthly pack meeting. Aids den leaders by coordinating monthly program. Attends monthly leaders' meeting.

NEW MEMBER COORDINATOR Serves as welcoming ambassador for the unit. They will work with the unit committee to help implement their Unit Membership Plan.

PACK DUES — This is an additional charge your local unit (pack) will collect for activities planned for the year. The cost varies by unit, but ranges from \$40 - \$80 annually. There are multiple opportunities throughout the year for your child to earn the money needed to attend camp and participate in planned activities.

PACK PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

CUB SCOUTS: ADVENTURE DAYS These action-packed events feature archery, BB Guns, field games, crafts, STEM, and much more. There are 2 different locations and dates for these events so that you can choose what's most convenient for your family.

PINEWOOD DERBY Scouts participate in the thrill of model car racing! The Pinewood Derby is a parent/child project in which they build a race car from a block of wood. Cub Scouts race their cars against one another in the pack.

SPORTS DAYS Cub Scouts will have the opportunity to see their favorite sport teams in action. (White Sox, Chicago Cubs, Chicago Wolves, Chicago Blackhawks, and many more!)

CUB SCOUT DAY CAMP Held in locations throughout the Chicago and Northwest Indiana area, day camp is a great opportunity for Cub Scout summer fun! Day Camps feature shooting sports (Archery and BB where permitted), games, Scout skills, crafts, and much more.

SCOUTING FOR FOOD The annual food drive is held in the spring to benefit local food banks as part of our "Good Turn" to help the hungry.

FIELD TRIPS AND SPECIAL OUTINGS These are great ways to learn more about the people and places in your community.

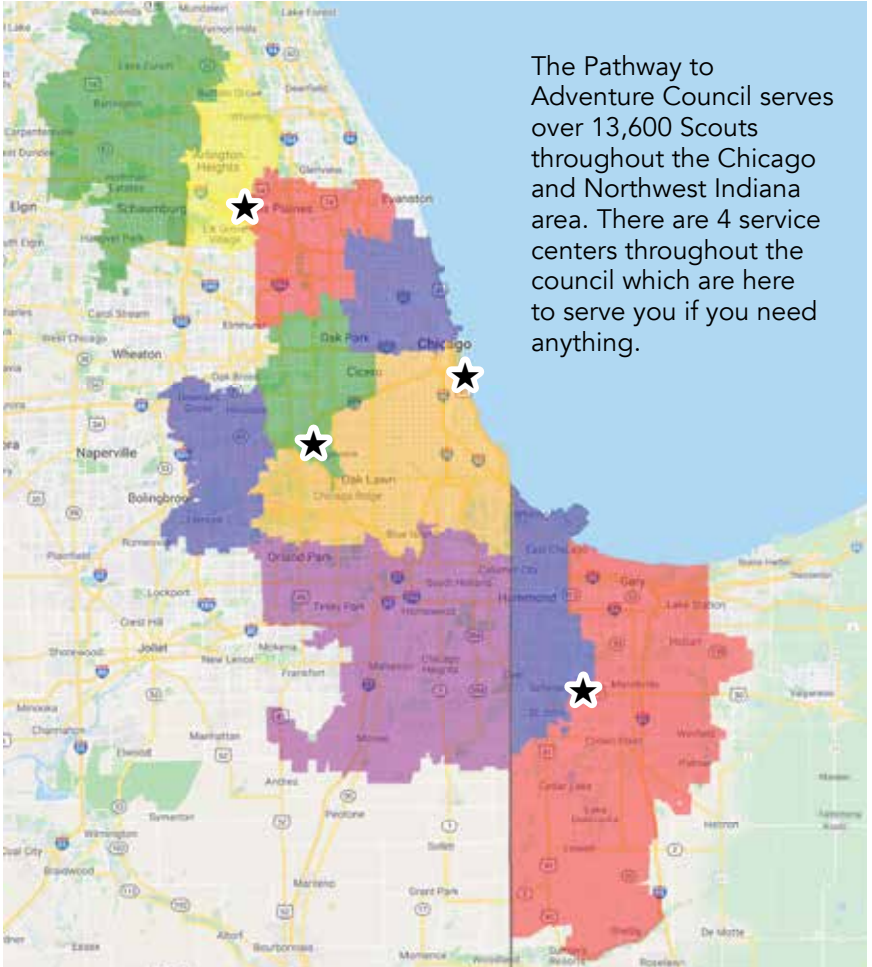
BLUE & GOLD BANQUET A birthday party for Scouting held at your Pack meeting in February. Most often a meal along with special programs or entertainment is included. This is also where Pack leaders and volunteers are recognized.
