



PEER JURY VS. LAW ENFORCEMENT EXPLORING POST

Both Peer Jury and Law Enforcement Exploring provide meaningful experiences for youth, but they serve very different purposes. This guide breaks down their key differences in purpose, structure, and outcomes.

PURPOSE

Peer Jury

- Offers a **restorative justice** alternative for first-time youth offenders.
- Focuses on **accountability and rehabilitation**, not punishment.
- Helps divert youth from formal court systems.

Law Enforcement Exploring Post

- Provides **career exploration** for youth interested in policing and criminal justice.
- Builds leadership and skills through **real-world law enforcement experiences**.
- Encourages **community service and personal development**.

Youth Involved	Youth jurors & youth offenders	Youth members ("Explorers")
Adults Involved	Adult advisors (non-interfering)	Law enforcement officers & trained advisors
Age Range	13–17 (varies)	14–20 (must have completed 8th grade)

ACTIVITIES & STRUCTURE

Peer Jury

- Simulated court-style **hearings** for real misdemeanor cases.
- Youth jurors decide on **restorative consequences** (e.g., apologies, service).
- Offenders must **admit guilt** to participate.
- Meetings as cases are assigned.

Law Enforcement Exploring Post

- **Hands-on law enforcement training** (e.g., traffic stops, first aid).
- Opportunities for **ride-alongs**, field trips, and **competitions**.
- Regular meetings, often **weekly or bi-weekly**.
- Strong focus on **career mentorship and leadership**.
